Be brief—don't just tell them—show them; ask short questions using plain words—one fact per question; ask leading questions—write questions that must be answered yes; ask only questions to which you already know the answer and be ready to "prove up"; don't let the witness merely repeat direct testimony—set the trap before springing it.

Don't let the witness explain—secure your right to control the witness; listen to the witness's answer—record important testimony in the witness's own words; don't quarrel with the witness—do not improve the witness's prior statement; avoid the "one question too many"—stay well clear of the door; save argument for summation—

resist temptation to wrap your cross into a neat package.
